A General Framework for Comprehension Strategy Instruction

- 1. Select the text: Choose an appropriate piece of text from the students' reading text.
- **2. Select the strategy:** Determine a strategy that is relevant to the understanding of that text.
- 3. Give a clear explanation: Tell students what the strategy is and why it is useful.
- **4. Model the strategy:** Help students learn how, when, and where to use the strategy by demonstrating, or model thinking about how to use the strategy to better understand the text.
- 5. Support student practice: Work with students to help them figure out how and when to use the strategy themselves. Engage the students in discussion about how they are applying the strategy; as necessary, provide corrective feedback.
- **6. Have students apply the strategy:** In subsequent lessons, ask students to apply the strategy on their own to other texts. (Be prepared to do additional modeling and guided practice.)
